Dear Friends in Christ,

At the risk of ruining someone's summer, I want to raise a serious issue.

I know summer is the time the kids are out of school, so it is easier to do things as a family. It's easier to get away for a week of vacation or a trip to see grandparents or just a day of being together doing something everyone enjoys. It's easier to go to baseball games and "up north" and sleep in. It's easier to do yard work and home repairs and shade tree mechanics.

All of those things are important for all kinds of reasons. It's important for relationships to spend time together as a family to renew and strengthen family ties. It's important for good health to get away from the regular rat-race to spend time de-stressing. It's important for safety to get maintenance things done to keep things working smoothly.

Summer is the time to kick back and relax, to spend time as a family, to get things done you can't get done during the rest of the year, but there is also the concern of doing all these things at the risk of losing something else even more important.

When I meet someone in the grocery store that I haven't seen at worship in some time, the first thing I hear is how terribly busy this summer has been for them. I try to be polite and not rain on their parade, but a question constantly enters my mind as I listen to the litany of activities and plans: "But what are you doing to build and maintain a foundational relationship with God in Jesus Christ for yourself and your kids that will see you through the easy as well as the difficult times of life?"

I wish I could say life was easy all the time for all of us, but we all know that's just not true. Life may be easy at the moment for you, to which I say, "thank God!" But we also know life can be hard, and sometimes suddenly hard. Remember the stock market drop of 18 months ago? How many of our members and friends are out of work or are re-employed at a far lower level? How many

people are we praying for because they're dealing with cancer, ill health, tough situations?

I'm privileged to be invited into people's lives when the going is tough: in the dying and death of a loved one, in the times before surgery and during recuperation, when the economy has kicked us in the teeth again, when we wonder how we can ever hold everything together. From my experience, it has been those who have had a solid foundation of faith in Jesus Christ, who know the sure and certain hope of eternal life in God's love, and who have actively lived out that faith and hope with other Christians who have fared the best in the toughest of time. Time after time after time, people have shared with me that it was their faith relationship with God in Jesus Christ that brought them through the toughest of times, given them hope in the darkest of days, and lifted them up at the lowest points in their lives.

My serious concern in the midst of summer: if the summer leisure time has become a rat-race that simply takes the place of the regular rat-race of life with a new set of expectations and exhaustions, then I'd suggest a second look at your foundational relationships with God in Jesus Christ and with other Christians.

Is your house of faith in good enough shape to weather the trials of life, or does the foundation need some attention? Is it time to worship again? Is it time to learn of Christ again? Is it time to get together with other people of faith and hope to support others with God's love and receive the same support yourself?

I know, it's a serious topic for a summer newsletter, but it's important for one's whole house to be in order, and not just the room we call leisure or recreation. Building a solid foundation for faith and life is just as important during summer recreation time as it is during the rest of the year.

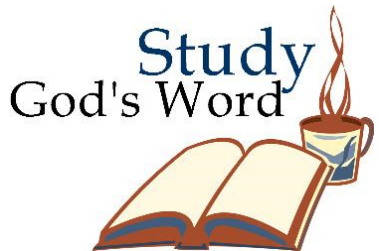

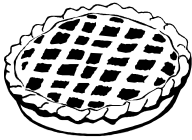

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

This month I'd like to share some thoughts and reflections on the Greater Milwaukee Synod Assembly that was held the first weekend in June. Hello? anyone still out there reading? I'm guessing with an opening line like that a few people might skip to something else to read and I can understand why. But give me a few minutes and I hope you'll find it was worth it to get to the end of my column.

I'll start out by acknowledging the less exciting but necessary "business" part of the Assembly. Our Synod has over 100 churches and over 91,000 members so when we get together we need to talk about and make decisions on business issues. At the Assembly we spent time discussing and passing a budget, we elected 18 representatives to the Churchwide Assembly in 2011 and we passed a couple resolutions; one on changes to the Board of Pensions (for Pastors) and one on working to have more Youth represented at the Synod Assembly.

Bishop Jeff Barrow gave his report and I was encouraged by what I heard. The Bishop acknowledged the need to address the ministries to the UW-M and Marquette campuses and he shared how he was hiring staff to help focus on outreach and on underserved communities. He also acknowledged the need to have honest conversations with congregations who are facing dwindling attendance and questions about their future.

We heard a report from the National ELCA office and I learned that over 40 new mission churches were funded by the ELCA last year. That means our Trinity Lutheran Church and other churches in our Synod helped over 40 new churches get started last year and the National ELCA is planning over 30 new churches next year. I also learned about the millions donated to initial and ongoing ELCA relief efforts in Haiti (every ELCA relief dollar goes to relief not to administrative overhead).

We also heard from some local congregations who have grown outreach programs from small beginnings to amazing stories. Like Norway Lutheran Church who grew a “Blessing of the Bikes” event (Harleys not Treks) from just 20 bikes to now over 500. And a church in Waukesha that had one congregation member with a relative in jail, that member started reaching out to others in jail and members of the congregation joined in. Now that church has an annual book drive for the Waukesha County jail and members have done other things to show God’s love to those incarcerated.

Folks, we are part of something big. The Synod Assembly helped me remember that. The theme of this year’s Assembly was “Beyond the Walls” and if I summarize the message behind that it would be **let’s do God’s work out in God’s world.** I heard a lot of stories and examples of how we do that from outreach efforts here in Milwaukee, mission churches here, across the USA and the rest of the world, to relief efforts in Haiti, to ongoing Pastoral support in Costa Rica and Africa. From a money standpoint our individual offering is pooled with others at TLC, and then the few thousand dollars TLC sends to the Greater Milwaukee Synod is pooled with other Synod Churches and then some of that is sent to the National ELCA. And it isn’t only our money that we pool, it is our collective efforts to do God’s work in God’s world that help make changes.

I hope you made it to the end of this column and I hope it was worth it to be reminded that we are part of something BIG!

NEW BOOK REVIEWS FROM YOUR TRINITY LIBRARY:

School's Out

by Wanda E. Brunstetter, Barbour Publishing, paperback, 160 pages

Our younger readers (ages 9-12) will enjoy School's Out! Nine-year-old Rachel Yoder is a delightfully high-spirited Amish girl who finds plenty of trouble amid the rolling hills of Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. When she's not getting locked in a root cellar, bringing frogs to church, or taking wild buggy rides, she's setting fireflies free and trying out new skateboards in all the wrong places. Kids will love this fun new series--full of adventure and mischief.

Author Wanda E. Brunstetter, fascinated by the Amish people during the years of visiting her husband's family in Pennsylvania, combined her interest with her writing and now has seven novels about the Amish in print, along with numerous other stories and ministry booklets. She lives in Washington State, where her husband is a pastor, but takes every opportunity to visit Amish settlements throughout the states.

The Sisters of Sinai: How Two Lady Adventurers Discovered the Hidden Gospels

by Janet Soskice, publisher Knopf, hardcover, 336 pages

In 1892, two sisters, identical twins from Scotland, made one of one of most important scriptural discoveries of modern times. Combing the library of St. Catherine's Monastery at Mount Sinai, they found a neglected palimpsest, a manuscript that has been erased, for reuse of the paper. Beneath an unprepossessing life of female saints,

they detected what remains to this day among the earliest known copies of the Gospels, a version in ancient Syriac, the language spoken by Jesus. The Sisters of Sinai is the enthralling account of how two ladies in middle age and without university degrees uncovered and translated this text, bringing a great biblical treasure to world attention.

Janet Soskice takes us, via the lives of Agnes and Margaret Smith, on a quintessentially Victorian adventure. It is partly a physical journey: when Westerners generally feared to tread in the region, the sisters Smith traversed the Middle East, sleeping in tents, enduring temperamental camels and unscrupulous dragomen, and facing uncertain welcome from monks deceived by earlier travellers. It is also a journey of the mind: in an era when religious faith was under attack, when new discoveries in science and archaeology were rewriting the accepted understanding of the Bible's origins as well as those of humankind, a great contribution to knowledge was made by two whose only natural advantage was an astonishing gift for languages, modern as well as classical. Finally, and most movingly, it is a progress of the human spirit. Unwilling to let their lack of formal training or the disdain and jealousy of male scholars stand in their way, Agnes and Margaret became renowned scriptural authorities, in joyful pursuit of their lifelong passions for adventure and learning. Here, rousingly recounted, is the story of two unlikely and unsung heroines of the continuing effort to discover the Bible as originally written.
