Dear Friends in Christ,

Ministry at TLC continues to be a multi-faceted experience, but May seems to be a special time of caring for others through outreach and worship.

We have a local 'mission trip' planned to help build housing in Milwaukee for people in need of affordable housing. This is our 5th year of working with Habitat for Humanity through the Thrivent Builds program.

We are also inviting members of area congregations to our Service of Prayer for Healing on May 27 at 7:00 PM. While we've been taking this special time of prayer to focus on healing for more than a year, this is the first time we've invited others outside our congregation to be involved.

Our Youth are leading a Join Hands day for both adults and youth that will be making fleece blankets and toiletries kits for homeless teenagers in Milwaukee County. This isn't just for the youth of the congregation. They are hoping to get as many adults involved as possible on Sunday, May 2 between 1 and 4 PM. How many blankets are produced and kits put together will completely depend on youth and adults 'joining hands' to care for those who have no home of their own to go back to.

Members continue to bring communion to shut-ins and those in nursing homes. Other members continue to hold up Fair Trade issues for us. Another member has volunteered to help care for the earth by being available Saturday morning, May 8, to collect left-over and unused medications for recycling that afternoon at the State Fair Grounds. Other members have brought gift cards to grocery stores and gas stations to distribute to people in need of assistance.

I suppose I could go on for quite a while listing the things TLC members are involved in this month. It will have to suffice simply to say our ministry as the Body of Christ doesn't slow down with the end of the school year approaching. It continues strong and vibrant, and for that I thank you, the members of TLC who give of yourselves, your time and your treasure, and thank God for blessing you with the gift needed to carry out Christ's ministry in this time and place.

NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT

“Today I bought a pitchfork”, that is how Sandy started her May “Tidings” column last year.

Sandy did connect the pitchfork with the message of the column saying it could be used to dig to the bottom of the messes in our kid’s rooms. That hasn’t changed, their rooms are still a mess and a pitchfork would be helpful in cleaning things up, although I’m not sure the person going off to college still has the messiest room.

By the time you read this our daughter will have chosen a college and will be preparing to move out of the house in fall. I wonder if she’ll have the room cleaned by then. Having one less person in the house will be a big change for our family and that got me thinking about changes in our lives and Church.

Sometimes when people experience change in their lives they draw closer to God and the Church and sometimes the opposite is true. I was talking with someone in the congregation and they observed that people seem to get more involved in church when they have kids (now there is a change in your life!). Parents seem to attend worship more often when they take the kids to Sunday School, and Confirmation and Youth events. And sometimes it seems that when the kids have been Confirmed or left for college, the parents spend less time at church. I can think of examples of both types of behavior, drawing closer to God with change and drifting away.

Ok, you are probably asking what is your point Steve? My first point is that change happens. My second point is that our Church is a community and our community offers many different things to our members; different ways to socialize, different ways to study the Bible, different ways to worship, different ways to make music and different ways to serve God. Every week Pastor Bill makes an extra effort to make sure we know about these opportunities when he does the announcements before the services.

My third point is a reminder. When change happens, like when the kids are confirmed or they leave the house, I hope you will remember you are part of a great Church community that offers an amazing number of ways to connect to God and to each other. I think we offer something for everyone.

The Scholarship criteria will be published in the Tidings each month. Scholarship applications are now available either on a table in the Narthex or in the Church Office. The deadline for submission is May 1st. The decision on Scholarship Awards will be made by May 10th.

In order to continually promote the Scholarship Program we wish to promote the guidance for awarding Church Scholarships:

New Book Reviews from your Trinity Library:

Enough: Why the World's Poorest Starve in an Age of Plenty

by Roger Thurow, PublicAffairs publisher, hardcover, 416 pages

For more than thirty years, humankind has known how to grow enough food to end chronic hunger worldwide. Yet while the "Green Revolution" succeeded in South America and Asia, it never got to Africa. More than 9 million people die every year of hunger, malnutrition, and related diseases—most of them in Africa and most of them children. More die of hunger in Africa than from AIDS and malaria combined. Now, an impending global food crisis threatens to make things worse.

In the west we think of famine as a natural disaster, brought about by drought; or as the legacy of brutal dictators. But in this powerful investigative narrative, Thurow & Kilman show exactly how, in the past few decades, American, British, and European policies conspired to keep Africa hungry and unable to feed itself. As a new generation of activists work to keep famine from spreading, *Enough* is essential reading on a humanitarian issue of utmost urgency.

Roger Thurow has been a Wall Street Journal foreign correspondent for twenty years, and has reported from more than sixty countries, including two dozen in Africa. Scott Kilman has been the Journal's leading agriculture reporter. They have teamed up to produce a stream of page-one stories in the Journal that have broken new ground in our understanding of famine and food aid.

101 Ways to Help People in Need

You don't have to be the apostle Paul in order to share your faith. Relatively few of us are gifted in the area of evangelism. You may not be a gifted evangelist, but you do have the gift of servanthood. You can use that gift to reach out to your community with the love of God. For years Steve Sjogren has successfully used a simple approach called "servant evangelism" that allows any believer—regardless of gifting—to be involved in sharing God's love with others. One of the great things about this approach is that you don't have to do it alone. Janie Sjogren offers 101 simple and effective ways your church or small group can demonstrate the love of God to those in your community. And when people see the love of God in action, they want to know more about Him. You can share your faith successfully -- here are 101 ways to get started!

Steve and Janie Sjogren have been involved in church planting in Oslo, Norway; Baltimore, Maryland; and Cincinnati, Ohio. Janie is a graduate of Sonoma State University (California). Steve graduated from Lutheran Bible Institute of California and Bethany College (Kansas), and is the author of many books. The Sjogrens live in West Chester, Ohio, with their three children, Rebekah, Laura, and Jack.

FREE WILL? WHAT FREE WILL?

This Lent has taught me that Martin Luther was correct: We have no free will. Our wills are thoroughly corrupted by sin and our selfish desires.

See, I had given up sweets for Lent, and I really was doing pretty well. Pretty darn well. But then Shirley, one of my congregation's gracious grandmas, brought me a plate of her famous candy peanut butter Easter eggs.

Shirley is one of the best candy cooks in the entire Milky Way galaxy. For instance, there's her fudge, which has a gentle, moist, yielding texture with just a hint of crumble. Shirley's culinary alchemy transmutes the sweetness of sugar, the goodness of cream and the bitterness of chocolate into pure confectionary gold.

So I knew I was in big trouble when Shirley brought the peanut butter eggs.

Free will? Not a chance! My will mounted no defense and uttered not a whimper of protest. It simply surrendered. And the candy eggs were better than I imagined, since they had an extra ingredient - the intoxicating spice of forbiddenness.

Point is, our wills are never free when it comes to the sins and desires that tempt us. The more we are tempted, the more in bondage our wills remain.

Think about it. If we had truly free will, there would be no diet industry. As our culture waddles in obesity, we try this, we buy that, but the only thing getting thinner is our wallets - by \$40 billion a year

[the_diet_indust.html](#)). Our will to be thinner stands no chance against our will to eat fattening food. If our wills were truly free, wouldn't we simply choose to eat in moderation and exercise more?

The credit-card debt crisis is another product of our wills enslaved to sin and selfish desire. Like a flies in a spider's web, millions of Americans are trapped in consumer debt that far exceeds their ability to pay. We long to be debt free, but the more we struggle the more we are ensnared.

If we all had free will, really had free will, wouldn't those of us with stable jobs and a decent income simply choose to live on what we earn? If we had free will, it wouldn't be hard.

Instead of free will, let's talk about free choice, which we really do have. We are free to choose even those things that are bad. And because our wills are in bondage to sin, the results are always disastrous.

Just look around. On a conscious level, we tell ourselves that we really want to be healthy, to live on a planet that is clean, to use our resources in a sustainable way, and to love our neighbors as ourselves. But because of sin, we are perpetually unhealthy, our planet is polluted, we are gluttonous with its resources and care not a whit for our neighbors.

Paul put it well in Romans 7:19: "For what I do is not the good I want to do; no, the evil I do not want to do - this I keep on doing."

What's a species to do? Well, first, we can do nothing by ourselves, as Luther observes. We can only fall on our knees in repentance, ask God for forgiveness and let the grace of God wash us clean, renew our spirit and slowly - over a lifetime of repentance and prayer - help us make better choices.

Which is exactly what I intend to do - just as soon as I'm done with Shirley's peanut butter Easter eggs.
